God hears the cry of the people...

Then the Lord said,"I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey..." - Exodus 3:7-8

These words come from a passage in Exodus when God speaks to Moses from the burning bush. One strong theme of this interaction is that God has heard the cry of the people. These were the people who had been called by God, but now after many years they are miserable and suffering in oppressive slavery in the land of Egypt. But God had heard the cry of these people and is about to use Moses to lead them to freedom.

The idea that God hears, was an important theme for the Israelites in the Old Testament. God is a God who hears the cry of the oppressed. God has a heart for those who are marginalised, outcast and poorly treated. It is clear in the ministry of Jesus that he too had a heart for those who were marginalised, outcast and poorly treated in society. So today, we too should have a heart for people experiencing difficulty and oppression.

What could this mean for us today in light of our *A Fair Trade Lent* theme and our experience in our contemporary world. Well, we acknowledge that God still hears the voices of those who are in slavery across the world in our times. Maybe it surprises you to hear that it is estimated that 46 million people across 167 countries are currently in slavery - today in 2022!! In the cocoa industry alone it is recognised that 1.48 million children are involved in hazardous work, so that we in the comfort of our lounge rooms in the Western World can eat chocolate! This has to change...it is not fair! And so I want you today to wonder with me: What would slaves today be crying out for?

In Exodus God heard the cry of His people. Maybe the question for us to consider is:

Do we hear the cry of those in slavery today and what steps are we taking to respond to that cry? The Australian Modern Slavery Act is designed to address slavery which exists in the supply chains of many of the products which appear in retail outlets in Australia. We can start by becoming more aware of this. We could also look at how we can take action through organisations such as *Be Slavery Free*. And of course we can continue to review our own purchasing practices, seeking to buy fair trade and ethically sourced products. This is a faith issue for us to explore as we seek to love our neighbours and engage in justice in our world, so that God's kingdom can be seen and experienced here on earth as it is in heaven. The following is a prayer written by Fairtrade Advocate and friend of our congregation, Rev John Martin:



Listening God,

You heard the cry of your people in slavery in Egypt. You hear the cries of those in slavery and child workers in the world today. Help us to hear those cries.

Give us the courage and wisdom to act.

May our governments and those of nations around the world adopt practices that support workers around the world and bring an end to slavery in our days.
